**Rest in Peace** – The Archdiocese is grieving the loss of two more active priests. On Tuesday of this past week Fr. Kevin Morris, 62, pastor of three parishes, two schools, and a hospital chaplain in Richmond IN, was killed in a horrible car crash. His funeral will be in the Cathedral on Monday. On Friday evening we received word that Fr. Glenn O'Connor, 66, pastor of St. Suzanna in Plainfield, and Chaplain of the Indianapolis International Airport, died after suffering heart problems since the end of December. Both of these men are considered "young" in the scope of Archdiocesan priests. Fr. Ken Taylor, in the same age range, died in December. Please pray for our priests as they are being stretched even further. We have only one priest being ordained this summer.

## Happy St. Patrick's Day to all of the Irish! (And to those Irish for just a day.)

**Chrism Mass** – This annual event is a most sacred time when all priests of the Archdiocese re-commit themselves to the priesthood, to the leadership of the Bishop, and all concelebrate a most beautiful liturgy at the Cathedral. The Holy Oils, which we use for the sacraments the following year, are consecrated and distributed to all of the parishes during this ritual. Each parish sends a representative to receive the oils, and then they are initiated during our Holy Thursday solemn Mass. If anyone is interested in representing Immaculate Conception this year, please call the office sometime this week so arrangements can be made. While attendance is open to all, our official representative receives special seating.

**Tuesday** of this week is the feast of **St. Joseph**, the spouse of Mary and father of Jesus. While the scriptures seldom mention him, it is thought this is because he died prior to the public adult life of Jesus. But like any other father, he played a big role in the life of his son, and is a model for us today. Excerpts from a poem by John Shaughnessy, published in this week's Criterion may help to bring this saint to life:

#### He's My Son, Too

I promise, God, to stand by Mary. I promise to always love your son I promise through the joys and struggles, to always see that your will be done. I've never asked for any glory. I always want to be true to you. I just ask as you write his story, remember, Jesus is my son, too. My love for Mary grows stronger. I'm awed by her magnificent "Yes" She kindly tells me I've done the same. I'm just trying to give you my best. We begin the journey together. We know you'll be with us all the way. Still, a father wants more for his son, than to sleep in a manger of hay. I watch my wife and son together. I cherish their closeness and their love I want it to stay this way forever, but then he turns his gaze to above. I'm not sure why you ever chose me. It's not for the work that I've done. Still, I take my own measure of pride, in helping shape this carpenter's son. And when it's time to come home to you, let me feel the comfort of his arms My last prayer is please always keep him from all suffering, from any harm. I'm sure you will do what's best for him. It is what we fathers try to do.

I don't know the plan you have for him, still, he will do what you ask him to do.

Thank you for making me a father. It's a gift beyond any compare.

To know and love a child so deeply is the everlasting bond we share. Please keep him in your care forever. Let his heart and his soul remain true. Let his life serve all your dear children. I believe that's what our son will do.
