Funeral: On Thursday of this week we buried James A. Meyer, a former member of Immaculate Conception Parish. Please remember his wife, Rita, and his two children Kevin and Kelli and their families in your prayers. May his soul and the souls of all the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace.

Baptism: Today we welcome a new parishioner, Cain Richard Johannigman, infant son of Elizabeth and Bradley Johannigman. Cain will be baptized during our Sunday liturgy this morning, and we welcome him with much joy! Cain is extremely fortunate, because his parents are asking for baptism for him, because they are alive with God's love! And they are bringing him into this community of Faith, trusting that this community is also alive with God's love! And they need our support! We share the joy that they felt at his birth. And we share in the awesome responsibility of surrounding him with God's love. There is no miracle as moving as the birth of a child. The entrance of a child into our lives certainly never leaves us the same; and the celebration od Baptism should never leave the child, the family, or the parish community the same! So, let's reflect a bit on the rite and the symbols of Baptism.

Have you ever given a gift to someone because it said the right thing? Have you ever spent time with someone who simply needed your presence? These are symbolic actions. Symbolic actions often say more than our words can express. The Sacraments are **symbolic actions**. The mystery and wonder of God's life and love can never be contained in words. They are celebrated in symbolic actions. In the "Rite of Baptism" we celebrate the reality of being immersed in God's life through symbols:

The Gathered Assembly: the community gathered for the celebration represents the whole church, welcoming this new member and affirming the profession of our faith. Sunday is the preferred day for baptism because it is the day when the community of faith gathers, comes together to support one another. It is also the day when we profess our faith each week, a ritual. Sunday is also the day of Resurrection.

The Signing of the Cross: Parents, godparents, family members, and parishioners join in tracing the Sign of the Cross on the child's forehead. A "sign" on something shows its origins or its ownership. The Sign of the Cross shows that we belong to Jesus. For the Christian, it is the membership badge or identity sign. We sign ourselves multiple times as we celebrate our liturgy. By tracing this sign reverently, we welcome this child into the worldwide community that has made the cross its distinguishing sign. It is another way of saying that from now on, this child will never walk alone or carry the cross alone. It is a lifetime guarantee that we share in the Resurrection which comes through the cross.

Anointing: The first anointing, with the oil of catechumens, calls on Christ to strengthen the child being baptized, especially for the times when living life as a follower of Jesus will become challenging. The second anointing, with the oil of Chrism (perfumed) is a sign of strengthening to live as a follower of Jesus, a life that is priestly, prophetic, and royal: bringing God to a needy world, to speak the truth of God's love, and to serve the poor and afflicted with compassion. This second anointing expresses hopes for the child.

Water: Water of course is the central symbol of Baptism. Water is a sign of life and fruitfulness as well as death and destruction. Water has the power to give life, save life, or take life away. Using water in Baptism reminds us of this power and helps us to experience our dying with Christ and our rising with him to new life. Because of Baptism, sin is destroyed, new life emerges; all is clean, refreshed, and made new.

The White Garment: A white garment is placed on the newly baptized, a sign of new status. It symbolizes that the one baptized has put on new life as a child of God and is now a new creation! In the first centuries, the Christians were new clothes after their Baptism to proclaim their new life in Christ. The white garment is a continuation of this practice. We promise to "put on Christ" throughout our lives. This symbol can also be a reminder to wrap the child in the care and compassion of Christ.

The Lighted Candle: The Baptismal candle is lit from the parish's Easter Candle, a sign of the risen Christ. This symbol reminds all of us that the child is welcomed into the Church to participate is being the "light of the world." The candle is a visible reminder that the light of Christ is to be kept burning all through life, a light shining is what is sometimes a dark world. The symbols of the lighted candle and the white garment capture in a unique way the challenge of Baptism as we hear "you are God's own people, called out of darkness into his marvelous light."

Baptism touches our entire life. The **beginning**, and what seems to be the **end** of our earthly life are entwined. Many of these symbols recur in the funeral liturgy. At the door of the church, the presider sprinkles the coffin with holy water and recalls the water of Baptism. Then the Pall, a symbol of the baptismal white garment, is placed on the coffin. The body is brought into the midst of the assembly, just as the child is brought in at the time of Baptism. The Easter candle burns beside the coffin. This symmetry and relationship remind us that our Christian identity, begun at baptism, underlies all other descriptions of who we are! We are first baptized in Christ!

"Where your treasure is, there also will your heart be." (Matt 6:21) After Jesus teaches his disciples how to pray, he offers them a lesson in perseverance. Jesus tells his disciples to store up treasure in heaven, despite the losses they experience in human terms. What is earthly success compared to accomplishing God's will, which lasts forever? We are earthen vessels, the humblest of containers, made to hold something of far greater importance than our own small dreams and desires. We hold a treasure! God dwells in us.
