Hot off the press: In the fall of 2018, Archbishop Charles Thompson launched a major strategic and pastoral planning process for the Archdiocese of Indianapolis. He appointed a 25-member planning committee composed of Chancery Staff, priests, deacons, laity, and agency representatives. They based their planning and research on Pope Francis' 2013 Apostolic Exhortation *Evangelii Gaudium* – <u>The Joy of the Gospel.</u> On Friday we received the fruits of their labor, an Archdiocesan Strategic and Pastoral Plan for 2021-2024, reminding us of our ultimate goal to make Christ present in our world and to bring the world to Christ. This strategic plan sets goals and objectives for the Archdiocese, and challenges all of us to see the future church in terms of **Mission**. A limited number of copies are available in the entry way. It will serve as a framework for our local parish planning. Implementation will follow. A letter from our Chancellor is on the bulletin board.

The annual "Budget Guidelines" (25 pages) have also arrived, and will keeps us busy for the next few weeks.

We continue to pray for peace in our country, in our parish, and in our own hearts. In addition, we recognize our own responsibility to be people of peace in all of our endeavors. As a Community, we join in prayer for the transformation of our hearts, our families, our parish, our political systems, and our country.

"God of all, IGNITE us with the fire of your love. INFLAME our hearts with courage to embrace dialogue that transforms and truth that frees. KINDLE our love with kindness to heal divisions and reconcile relationships. LIGHT our imaginations with insight to envision and create a world where all are one. STIR our actions with justice and peace to engage critical concerns and cherish all of life. FIRE our lives with audacity and hope to risk all for God's mission."

LENT – is meant to be a "time out" of time – a piece of life dedicated to rethinking all of it. It's time to ask where we were last year at this time and where we are now. Or, most of all, where we want to be? And, what do we need to get there?

Lent leads us to the resurrection of our souls from the emptiness of purpose, to the model of the self-giving, Jesus, whose cross calls us to spend our own lives for the good of others.

Lent calls us to take the space and time we need to make the changes of life we need. It's about plotting our own renewal into a more peaceful, a more regular, a less hectic self. It's about sinking into the kind of personal reflection that brings us to confront the self for which we seek. Lent is the time to renew the best in us.

Cemetery prepares for annual clean up: before mowers can begin, and that day is quickly approaching, the winter decorations, worn and tattered flowers and wreaths, and all types of flying debris need to be collected and removed. This is a reminder that all grave adornments need to be placed only on the monument itself, or on a shepherd's crook. Families members are asked to assist in the clean up of the graves of loved ones. The Cemetery Committee will finish the process in the very near future, perhaps as soon as this week.

Annually we receive **Lenten Guidelines from the Office of Worship**, reviewing rituals for this season, suggestions, and updated regulation. We received those guidelines and were informed that they were waiting to include the very latest state mandates on COVID and to include updated protocols for this year, Lent 2021. The very first words on the page were this:

The dispensation from the obligation to participate at Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation is extended in the Archdiocese and throughout the whole State of Indiana until further notice.

Some were hoping the dispensation would be lifted. It was not. Please see a summary of the document on the bulletin insert of last week.

One of the precautions that we **WILL** let go of, is that of not using the kneelers. Thank you so much for being patient with this process. As you recall, the kneelers were not sanitized weekly, because of the cloth surface, and risk of mildew. So not using them was a far better choice than the risk of contamination. However, we are hoping the greatest risk is behind us there. We will still **not** be sanitizing them, but are hopeful that this is a good time to resume kneeling once again. Beginning immediately, we will resume our prior posture of kneeling for prayer as we enter the church, during the consecration and immediately after communion. Falling back into the old habit won't be hard. We are accustomed to respecting the Eucharist. Breaking the old habit was very difficult. The rest of our "frequently touched surfaces" will continue to be sanitized after each use, to keep any virus carried in under good control.

On March 17th we received an updated Executive Order from Gov. Eric Holcomb, with continuing guidelines. It places Decatur County clearly in the blue metric at present, which is the lowest rate of disease transfer since September. If you remember, when we reached that plateau in Fall, we felt able to remove the tape on the pews and allow open seating in our Church. We are NOT relieved of the need for safe distancing, and are encouraged to continue the six-foot space at all times inside or out. However, if we are able to maintain that blue status for two consecutive weeks, we might be able to place the responsibility for spacing ourselves up to each individual, or up to each family. We are hoping that enough people are vaccinated now to prevent the spikes that we saw in December. We are also hoping that our Easter crowd will be able to fill in comfortably also maintaining the six-foot distancing that you model. If the tape is gone next week, it means we are moving forward, safely. The tape on the floor will remain to guide our steps. If there are new spikes related to "spring break" aftermath, then the tape will remain or be replaced. As always, if you need help finding a safe space, our ushers are there to help.

Yes, we will have **palms** next Sunday! However, we will not process in with them. They will be up front. They will be blessed, and then they will be distributed. There is an ample supply ordered so feel free to pick up more after Mass.
