Cemetery prepares for annual clean up: before mowers can begin, and that day is quickly approaching, the winter decorations, worn and tattered flowers and wreaths, and all types of flying debris need to be collected and removed. This is a reminder that all grave adornments need to be placed only on the monument itself, or on a shepherd's crook. Families members are asked to assist in the clean up of the graves of loved ones. The Cemetery Committee will then finish the process.

This week, Gov. Eric Holcomb has announced that the **State Emergency Plan** for protection from the COVID 19 virus will officially end at the end of April. Though he strongly encourages continuation of the precautions that are currently in place until the time when we reach herd immunity, beginning April 6th, responsibility for mandates, safety precautions, and protection in public places, will shift to the County and local government. Marion County, and Indianapolis, the most highly populated area of our state, has already stated that it will continue the current precautions, at least until the end of May. We have not received a statement from Decatur County. However, concerning our parish, we will follow the guidelines recommended by the Archdiocese, even as we begin to relax our concern. Even as the tape and markings disappear, we need to be personally vigilant about social distancing, masking and sanitizing.

Steeple – If you passed by this week and saw a Kramer Roofing truck (our steeple contractors) in our lot, you may be wondering, "now what?" We had some problems with the church clock and chimes. When Norbert Hoeing went up to investigate the issue, he found that he was unable to access the clock faces from the inside, as the access panels were completely sealed. Kramer Roofing returned, custom created, and installed, new panels in all four directions. Thanks to them for their very quick attention to this matter. And thank you to Norbert for continuing to take full responsibility for maintaining our clock. He could use a young apprentice!

Thanks also to those who have been so diligent in cleaning up the cemetery! It is looking good!

Jewish Customs: As we embark on our Holy Week customs and celebrations, let us walk in solidarity with our Jewish brothers and sisters who likewise begin the Jewish Passover customs. While our faiths differ, our customs and traditions have a shared history. Let us continue to pray for them and reverence that history.

Palm Sunday - Today is a day of both great joy, and terrible sorrow. It is a time of despair, perplexity, and contradiction. Jesus went to Jerusalem to join the throngs of other Jews to celebrate the Passover feast as prescribed in the Old Testament. He and His followers traveled on foot until they reached the gates of the city, less than two miles from Bethany. Other pilgrims who had already arrived, came out to welcome the new arrivals. Some had never met Him, but were caught up in the excitement. The very people who applaud Christ's entrance into Jerusalem, shouting out "Hosanna" will, within a week, be crying out, "Crucify Him." They will first praise Him and then mock Him. Even friends entering at His side will desert Jesus. The story begins today, and we are in the crowd, waving our palm branches. This was not lost on the Pharisees, who regarded His increasing popularity as a growing threat. Riding on a barrowed donkey, Jesus makes a humble entrance. This joyful scene belies the sorrow and agony that will soon follow.

Palms were symbols of life among the nomads crossing the desert. They rejoiced upon seeing a palm, as it indicated an oasis of life-giving water was near. Palms were also a sign of victory, success, and glory. We know His true victory, will come through the cross. We know how it will end. We know that joy will turn to sorrow, but then back to joy again! The palms we take home with us are a reminder of Christ's victory over death, and that we too, can achieve everlasting life!

Chrism Mass – Tuesday afternoon, televised from the cathedral, the priests of the Archdiocese will renew their vows, and the Holy Oils, used during the coming year, are blessed and distributed to all parishes.

Holy Thursday – the celebration of the Mass of the Lord's Supper. This is the day we celebrate the institution of the Mass, and honor the Blessed Sacrament, present within each church. Because of COVID the celebration will be much simpler this year. We will omit the washing of feet. And there will be no procession with the Blessed Sacrament, no hour of adoration following Mass. We would encourage each person to take a quiet time of personal prayer, during the evening or night, remembering that he asks "watch one hour with me." (The agony in the garden.)

Good Friday – The day of the Lord's Passion and death. This day is observed as a quiet day, a somber day, a day of quiet, a day of **fasting and abstinence**. John's Passion Gospel is read, and we adore the cross, and receive the Eucharist. This celebration is also modified due to COVID. We will not touch or kiss the cross. As we come forward, observing social distancing, we will either genuflect or bow to the cross, reverently honoring our Savior.

The Easter Vigil - while this feast is the culmination of the Holy Season, we will not celebrate it here at Immaculate Conception, but will re-convene on Easter morning.

Easter Sunday - The Paschal Candle is blessed and lighted, and we will renew our baptismal promises.

The dispensation from the obligation to participate at Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation is extended in the Archdiocese and throughout the whole State of Indiana until further notice.
