Decatur County Board of Health: Our numbers went up a little this week, but only a little, so we remain in the blue zone on the matrix. We are doing well as a county compared to many others. We will continue to monitor, while taking our lead from the Archdiocese.

The spring **Archdiocesan Business Meeting** took place on Tuesday of last week, and while some expected the dispensation to be lifted, it was not. The report indicated that this topic is receiving much discussion and consideration, and while not recommending that anyone, at any age, refrain from attending liturgy, some still consider it too soon to mandate church attendance. While vaccines have helped tremendously to ease the anxiety and offer a much safer option for all, many counties are still in a yellow zone rather than blue. We anticipate frequent updates to the precautionary recommendations, and will perhaps lift the dispensation in a few weeks. In the meantime, the message to be circulated is that **Mass attendance is a Privilege and a Joy**, rather than looking upon it as an obligation. All are invited, regardless of age, and all are to be protected and kept safe. The continued expectation of Archbishop Thompson is that a face covering be worn at all liturgies, and at all times within our parish buildings. If our activities are outside, we can ease up a bit. The greater danger is within the confined space. He still encourages safe distancing, and sanitizing of hands, every time we pass in and out of the buildings.

One precaution that has been lifted is the empty holy water font. As long as everyone is hand sanitizing, we are able to begin filling the font again. Use of the holy water, of course, is optional, but it will be available at the main entrance very soon. In addition, if our numbers stay low, we will discontinue the signing in process. The ushers will (probably forever) need to get an accurate count. That process was initiated long before COVID hit the stage. Attendance records guide lots of decisions, especially allocation of scarce resources, our priests.

Concerning COVID-19 vaccinations: ALL are strongly encouraged to receive the vaccine "to promote the common good and protect the health of the most vulnerable among us." But, note there is **no policy requiring** parishioners, or volunteers, to get vaccinated. They go on to quote from a recent USCCB document which states: "Being vaccinated safely against COVID-19 should be considered an act of love of our neighbor and part of our moral responsibility for the common good."

The dispensation from the obligation to participate at Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation is extended in the Archdiocese and throughout the whole State of Indiana until further notice.

Dear Brothers & Sisters in Christ,

Dear Priests & PLCs:

Your voice could help save millions of lives. The Hyde Amendment has protected Americans from funding abortion for 45 years. It's credited with saving the lives of over **2.4 million children** to date.
