**Painting Project:** The painters continue, working on the side walls with the help of a lift, and most often two or three painters, as labor remains an issue. Progress is readily visible. The front, including both sacristies, is finished. The West side wall, including all windows, is also completed. The three entry ways are finished along with the confessional, and restroom. Work continues on the North or back side, with smaller scale scaffolding in the choir loft, with the staircase, balcony, and rear windows still incomplete. The East side wall, and windows have not yet been painted. With the holiday and the projected completion date quickly approaching, discussion has turned to firming up those projections. It is becoming more and more certain that we will not be finished by Thanksgiving. A more realistic projection now is for the painting to be finished by December 5<sup>th</sup>. With clean up and aftermath projected for a minimum of two weeks. If all goes well, that puts us back into the church on December 19, the Sunday before Christmas. This is just an estimate, as nothing is in stone. A reminder to pray for the safety of our crew as they move forward. We are grateful for the progress, even as we await the time when we can begin re-entry.

After referring the matter to Mark Stier, he also assessed the situation, and determined that the furnace could not be saved. Imagine my panic with temps falling and the current shipping backlog. But by the end of day three, Mark and Paul had installed a new furnace, which they have given to us at cost, and once again, as with the AC this summer, they have contributed the labor! Thank You, Stier Brothers, for coming to our rescue!
