A Word from Pope Francis:

"In facing our shortcomings and our failures, Jesus assures us that we are always in time to put right with good the harm done. Those who have caused tears, make someone happy; those who have wrongfully taken, give to those who are in need. By doing so, we will be commended by the Lord "because we have acted with prudence", that is, with the wisdom of those who recognize themselves as children of God and challenge themselves for the Kingdom of Heaven."

Sunday Readings:

A healthy person, who seldom or never needs a physician, finds difficulty in understanding the anguish, frustration, and 'never to be fulfilled' desires of the physically handicapped. In primitive societies and prescientific times, the condition of the handicapped was even worse than it is today. There were no rehabilitation programs for them, no wheelchairs or any equipment that gave them at least some relief. Since religious beliefs regarded their misery as related to sin and moral guilt, they were often outcasts for whom noboby cared.

We find it altogether natural, therefore, that the writers of the Bible used the wretched situation of the lame, the blind, the deaf, the epileptics, and the lepers as a figure to describe humankind's alienation from God, and the healing of these people as the sign of God's powerful and caring presence. Ethically speaking, we could be like some of those handicapped. Pray that the Lord may open your ears to listen to his message.
