A word on the readings:

The theme this week is Perseverance in Trials. We are told that day by day life can be a joyous experience. The commercials on television assure you that it will be if you buy what they try to sell you. This is also the message of not a few psychologists who assert that the learning process in school, home, life, job and religion/faith should all be one joyous experience! This is fine in theory but what happens if circumstances prevent our lives from being joyous all the time?

What if gradually a school becomes an anti-intellectual fun house? In this respect, teachers who do not dare to challenge their students are not their friends. As for the home, here too there are unpleasant chores to be done. And there are parents who spoil their children – doing them a great disservice for their later life.

Even if we love our work, there is no job that does not entail unpleasant aspects as well. And as far as religion is concerned, worship services should be a mutual inspiration, and a Christian life of mutual love is a splendid thing; however, we cannot have that good warm feeling all the time, neither is the church a theater where we go to enjoy "an exciting show!" Loyalty requires sacrifice.

Today's Liturgy deals precisely with those times when life seems to be anything but a joyous experience when Christians have to undergo disappointment, rejection, trials; and it sets forth the reserves that they can call upon to help them persevere. Can everything mentioned above continue to be a joyous experience in such circumstances? To a certain extent, yes, if we have learned the joy of sharing and of service, based on a firm faith in Someone who cares. Paul and Barnabas of the First Reading are encouraging examples for us.

In the First Reading Paul and Barnabas had the joyful experience of making many converts, but they also had to face the pain of rejection. Though persecuted, they could not but be "filled with joy and the Holy Spirit."

Life is never a continuous success story. When things do not go your way, think of Paul and Barnabas and their disciples. And with great faith make the Responsorial Psalm your prayer to God: "We are his people; the sheep of his flock." God cares!!
